THE FIRST SYMPOSIUM ON MODERN GREEK LITERATURE IN THE U.S.A.

A Symposium on Modern Greek Literature was held at the University of Maryland (Washington D.C.) from Monday 29 April to 1 May 1968. The Symposium which had an enormous success was organized by Professor K. Mitsakis, Chairman of the Department of Comparative Literature. Since this was the first Symposium on Modern Greek Literature that ever took place in the U.S.A. and since it was mainly addressed to an English speaking audience, it was evident that a special emphasis was given to writers who already enjoy a reputation outside Greece and whose the work is available in English translations, i.e. N.
