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# AN OUTLINE OF THE GREEK PRESS IN BULGARIA (1879-1906)

In this study I attempt an initial presentation of such material as has been preserved on the Greek press in Bulgaria, on the basis of the newspapers themselves, correcting the mistakes and filling in the gaps of works so far published in the Greek and foreign bibliography. I have found copies of these newspapers, bound into volumes (unfortunately all defective): 1) in the National Library in Athens, 2) in the Department of Old Publications (Staropečaten otdel) of the "Cyril and Methodius" Public Library in Sofia (NBKM), and 3) in the "Ivan Vazov" Public Library in Plovdiv in Bulgaria, where the greatest number of Greek newspapers are kept, classified in alphabetical order under the entry: "Publications in Greek".

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The history of the Greek press in Bulgaria begins in 1879 in Philippopolis, the modern Plovdiv, then the capital of the autonomous Ottoman province of Eastern Roumelia, with the publication of the newspaper Φιλιαπούπολις [Philippopolis]. Before 1878, i.e. until the foundation of the Bulgarian state and the creation of an autonomous Eastern Roumelia by the Treaty of Berlin (July 1878), no Greek newspaper or periodical was published by the Greek communities in present-day Bulgaria<sup>1</sup>. In fact, the only Greek printing press that had functioned in this area before this period, and that only for a short time (1839-1840), was Dimitrios Kalambakidis' press at Melenikon (Melnik)<sup>2</sup>

Article 40 of the "Organic Law of Eastern Roumelia" ensured the freedom of the press in this autonomous province within the Ottoman state<sup>3</sup>, and the publishing activity observed in the short space of its life 1878-1885 was very intense especially on the Bulgarian side<sup>4</sup>.

Our information to date on the Greek press in Bulgaria from Greek sources has been minimal and scattered, drawn from monographs on cities and articles on the cultural activity of the Greek communities in Bulgaria. Our knowledge of the Greek press there, was limited to the names of three or four of the bigger newspapers and outlines of the lives of the more important editors<sup>5</sup>.

The only collected bibliography on the Greek press in Bulgaria is in the three volume Bălgarski periodičen pečat 1844-1944. Anotiran bibliografski ukazatel [The Bulgarian Press 1844-1944. Annotated bibliography], by D. Ivančev, Sofia, Nauka i Izkustvo, vol. I, 1962, vol. II, 1966, vol. III, 1969.

The Greek press is considered in vol. III, pp. 14-17; but since D. Ivančev has not himself seen most of the newspapers, and his second-hand information about several of them comes from notices in the Bulgarian press of the period, the evidence with which he provides us is often insufficient or incorrect.

Before that, bibliographical information about all the Greek periodicals and newspapers published in Varna from time to time, had been included in I. Bliznakov's article "Varnenski periodičen pečat, 1880-1944" [The press of Varna, 1880-1944] in the periodical Izvestija na Varnenskoto Arheologičesko Družestvo [Bulletin of the Varna Archaeological Society] (hereafter IVAD), 12 (1961) 92-93. Unfortunately, though Blizankov mentions that several newspapers are to be found in the city's public library, I was unable to find any of them there (1974).



In the space of twenty-eight years (1878-1906), fifteen periodical and papers written in Greek, according to our present information, circulated in Bulgaria; to be precise: six in Philippopolis (Plovdiv): Φιλιππούπολις [Philippopolis], 'Ο Κοσμοπολίτης [The Cosmopolitan], 'Ο Μηνύτως τοῦ Αΐμου [The Balkan Messenger], Σατανᾶς [Satan], Εἰδήσεις τοῦ Αΐμου [Balkan News], 'Υγίειο [Health]; seven in Varna: Τηλέγραφος [Telegraph], 'Οδησσὸς [Odessa], Εὐξεινος [Euxine], 'Ανεξαρτησία [Independence], 'Ο 'Αμερόληπτος [The Impatrial], Πανδαισία [Banquet], Φωνή [Voice]; and two in Pyrgos (Burgas) Τὸ Βῆμα [The Rostrum] and Θεατής [Spectator]. Of, these papers the Philippopolis 'Ο Κοσμοπολίτης and the Varna Τηλέγραφος were published by non-Greeks. We can give the precise chronological limits of operation for only five of the newspapers: 1) Φιλιππούπολις 1879-1906, 2) 'Ο Μηνύτως τοῦ Αΐμου 1894-1896, 3) Εἰδήσεις τοῦ Αΐμου 1896-1906, 4) 'Υγίεια 1905-1906 and 5) Πανδαισία 1898-1900. Certain copies of the remaining papers are preserved which define the beginning of their lives but not the end.

These newspapers constitute a basic historical source for the history of the Greek communities of the Balkans, supplying information on the political, economic and cultural activity of Greeks in Bulgaria during the final quarter of the last century.

# PHILIPPOPOLIS (PLOVDIV)8

The newspaper printed its main news in French as well as in Greek. In the French text dates are given according to the new, Gregorian, calendar.

Its director was Ath. Nikolaidis, one of the Nikolaidis brothers who had published, in Constantinople, the daily paper  $K\omega\nu\sigma\tau a\nu\tau\nu\nuo\acute{\nu}\pi o\lambda\iota\varsigma$  [Constantinople]<sup>8</sup>. The fact that its editor was D.I. Koumarianos who with Vlassis Gavrillidis<sup>9</sup> was also one of the editors of  $K\omega\nu\sigma\tau a\nu\tau\nu\nuo\acute{\nu}\pi o\lambda\iota\varsigma$ , is typical. After the Russo-Turkish war, Ath. Nikolaidis and his editor Kumarianos began in Philippopolis the publication of the newspaper of the same name.

Φιλιππούπολις was published in Greek and French until 1885, and from 1885 to 1906 in Greek alone. The other editor, P.M. Marty, dealt with the French section. From the issue of 22/12/1879 no. 93 onwards the name of A. Passalery is mentioned instead of Marty's; the former was the chief engineer of the city, and for a time published a French satirical paper called *Le Charivari Rouméliote*<sup>10</sup>. From the issue of 29/3/1880 no. 119 onwards, Koumarianos alone is mentioned as editor.

D. Ivančev, in *Bălgarski periodičen pečat*, refers to Argyrios Dimitriadis as editor-in-chief in 1885, and Koumarianos as director and publisher. Argyrios Dimitriadis was, until his death in 1900, a teacher and governor of the Greek schools of Stenimakhos (today Asenovgrad)<sup>11</sup>.

In the first period of its life 1878-1885, Φιλιππούπολις found itself in continual opposition to the Bulgarian newspaper  $Marica^{12}$ , and its leaders often referred to articles in the Bulgarian paper. At this time its publisher, Ath. Nikolaidis, was not infrequently prosecuted by the Penal Court of the Pre-

fecture for insulting the authorities. This was usually the result of taking up a stand in opposition to that of *Marica*; in the first two years after the paper's foundation he was convicted twice<sup>13</sup>.

Soon after 1882 the name of Nikolaidis ceased to be mentioned, and Dimitrios I. Koumarianos alone became director and editor of the newspaper.

The newspaper had its own printing press, probably since its foundation.

After the destruction of his press in 1906 and his condemnation to death by the Internal Macedonian Revolutionary Committee [IMRO], Koumarianos fled to Greece. In 1910 he was appointed interpreter to the Royal Greek Embassy in Belgrade, where he died in 1912<sup>14</sup>.

His paper constitutes a highly valuable source for the life of the Greek communities in Philippopolis and Stenimakhos, and also gives us important information on the life of the other communities throughout Eastern Roumelia and Macedonia.

2) O KOEMOHOAITHE15 [The Cosmopolitan]. International newspaper of farming, trade and industry. Published every Sunday. Nos. 1-2 (3rd January - 6th February 1883).

Heading and text are printed in Greek, Bulgarian, Turkish, and French. The publisher was a Philippopolitan lawyer of Slovak descent, Ivan Petăr Žilka, who supported the view that the Aegean, the Danube, the Ober and the North Sea should be connected by canals.

The editor and the director are not mentioned in the heading. On the

last page the name of the publisher and man responsible for the paper is printed—Petros Christu.

In the issue of 12/10/1894 (no. 7), G.O. Skavanis is mentioned as director and owner.

From the second year (no. 89 of 5/9/1895), the paper was published three times a week.

From the issue of 12/10/95 (no. 103), Georgios Iv. Zeku became responsible. The paper ceased publication in February 1896, the last issue being no. 146 of 8/2/1896.

The publisher and editor of the paper, even though his name is not mentioned on the first issue, was Sotirios (Germanos) Skanavis<sup>17</sup>.

Newspaper published every Thursday and Sunday. Year 1, no. 1, Philippopolis 25/4/1896. Director and editor G. Mouseos].

From the issue of 2/6/1896 (no. 12), Sk[arlatos] Konstantinidis became editor-in-chief, and G. Museos director and co-editor. G. Museos ceases to be mentioned as the paper's director in 1897.

G. Museos, a well-known scholar of Philippopolis<sup>20</sup>, was appointed consular agent in Stenimakhos by order of the Greek Government<sup>21</sup>.

The paper was, at different periods, published three times, twice and once

a week. Argyrios Skarlatos Konstantinidis, a doctor, was director and editor of the paper from 1896 until it ceased publication in 1906<sup>22</sup>.

Some copies of an offshoot publication of the newspaper have survived; they have the title Μηνιαΐον Φιλολογικὸν Ἐπιστημονικὸν παράρτημα τῶν Εἰ-δήσεων τοῦ Αἴμου. [Monthly Literary and Scientific Supplement of the Balkan News]<sup>23</sup>. These are pamphlets I (January 1906) and II (February 1906), which contain amateurs stories and poems and translations of sentimental stories of no particular interest.

This is a popularized medical periodical. On p. 3 of the first instament we read: "Health has as its aim the development of the chief principles of health, the popularization of sundry information about it and the transmission of the rules of health".

The final instament no. 8 was published in April 1906. Armodios left for Athens, after the events of 1906, and continued publishing his periodical there for a short time<sup>26</sup>.

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7) ΟΔΗΣΣΟΣ. Ἐκδιδομένη κατὰ Σάββατον. Διευθυντὴς καὶ ἐκδότης ᾿Αναστ. ᾿Αθανασιάδης. Συντάκτης Β.Ν. Γουναρόπουλος. Ἔτος Α΄, ἀρ. 18, Βάρνα 11/5/1891² [Odessa. Published every Saturday. Director and publisher Anast. Athanasiadis. Editor V. N. Gounaropoulos. Year 1, no. 18, Varna 11/5/1891].

The paper from the issue of 4/9/1891 (no. 33) onwards was printed at its own press "Διεθνές τυπογραφείον 'Οδησσού" [Odessa International Printing]<sup>28</sup>.

From the issue of 10/8/1891 (no. 33) Charalambos A. Lambridis became director and publisher in place of Athanasiadis. V. N. Gounaropoulos continued as responsible editor and the paper was published twice a week.

From the issue of 17/1/1892 (no. 65), Ch. A. Lambridis became director and editor with sole responsibility, and the paper appeared three times a week.

As from January of the fourth year of its publication, certain changes were made in the paper: Ch. A. Lambridis became director and editor-in-chief, and G.O. Skanavis<sup>29</sup> co-owner and editor (no. 309 of 1/1/1894). The format of the paper became bigger, and was announced that in the next issue there would be published: "... the *Odessa* anthology, in which there will appear the finest short stories, in 36 supplements of 32 pages each"<sup>30</sup>. Unfortunately not a single one of these supplements has survived.

Ch. A. Lambridis is mentioned as sole owner and editor in the edition of 3/7/1894 (no. 356). G. O. Skanavis has moved on to found  $OM\eta r \dot{v} \tau \omega \varrho \tau o \tilde{v}$  A luov in Philippopolis in September 1894, as we have mentioned.

It is not known precisely when the newspaper ceased publication; the last issue preserved is from 1894. We have information from the local Greek press that at the end of 1894 the paper's publication was irregular<sup>31</sup>.

# (ΦΙΛΙΠΠΟΥΠΟΛΙΣ.)

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The satirical newspaper  $\Sigma \alpha \tau \alpha \nu \tilde{\alpha} \zeta$  of Philippopolis, issue no. 28, October 22, 1895.

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The newspaper 'Odnago's of Varna, issue no. 33, November 4, 1891

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[Euxine. Political, literary and commercial newspaper, published once a week. Director Anast. Athanasiadis. Responsible editor and publisher V.N. Gounaropoulos. Year 1, no. 1, Varna 30/3/94].

The paper very frequently found itself in opposition—often sharply—on community, and also on personal subjects with the  $O\delta\eta\sigma\sigma\delta\varsigma$ , and more particularly during its initial period, with its editor, G.O. Skanavis<sup>33</sup>. It is clear that the two newspapers represented two politically opposed factions in the spectrum of the Greek community of Varna, the same thing occurred in Philippopolis with the papers  $\Phi\iota\lambda\iota\pi\pi\sigma\acute{\nu}\pi\delta\iota\varsigma$  and  $Ei\delta\acute{\eta}\sigma\epsilon\iota\varsigma$   $\tau\sigma\~{\nu}$   $Al\mu\sigma\nu^{34}$ . I may note here the fact that the Euxine's director Anastasios Athanasiadis and its editor V.N. Gounaropoulos were the publishers of the  $O\delta\eta\sigma\sigma\acute{\sigma}\varsigma$ , up to no. 31, Gounaropoulos continuing as editor up to no. 64<sup>35</sup>.

V.N. Gounaropoulos, a musician and a director of the Varna Philharmonic<sup>36</sup>, and editor of the newspaper, gave up his work with it in April 1894 because, as the paper says, "he has moved to Athens in order to finish his musical studies"<sup>37</sup>. Thus from no. 34 onwards Anastasios Athanasiadis became both director and editor-in-chief.

After the edition of 25/2/1896 (no. 99), Aristodimos Chatzipetrou became responsible editor of the paper: he was a personality in the Greek community and a member of its council of elders.

The last edition of the newspaper preserved is no. 127 of 25/9/1896. It is not known when the  $E \mathring{v} \xi \epsilon \iota v \circ \zeta$  ceased publication.

9)  $O\Delta H\Sigma\Sigma O\Sigma$ -EYZEINO $\Sigma$ <sup>38</sup> [Odessa-Euxine]. I have found no information on this paper from any source except Ivančev, who mentions that it was published at the "International Press" of the  $O\delta\eta\sigma\sigma\delta\varsigma$  in 1897, and Bliznakov, who notes the following bibliographical evidence on it: "Odessa-Euxine, Greek newspaper, years I-IV, 1893-1897 (evidenced by the newspaper Svoboda, 7/4/1893)".

Perhaps this is a conflation of the titles of two separate newspapers, the  $O\delta\eta\sigma\sigma\delta\varsigma$  and the  $E\delta\xi\epsilon\iota\nu\sigma\varsigma$ , as neither Ivančev nor Bliznakov personally saw the paper, but drew their evidence from Bulgarian publications of the time.

10) ANEΞΑΡΤΗΣΙΑ<sup>30</sup> [Independence]. Newspaper published twice a week. Editor T. Paraschos. Varna, nos. 1-2 (1897).

The paper is not preserved in any library and information on it derives from the contemporary Bulgarian press.

11) ΑΜΕΡΟΛΗΠΤΟΣ. 'Εφημερίς πολιτική, ἐμπορική, φιλολογική καὶ κοινωνική ἐκδιδομένη Τετάρτη καὶ Σάββατον. Διευθυντής καὶ συντάκτης: 'Α. Δ. Οἰκονομίδης. 'Υπεύθυνος: Δρ. Β.Δ. Παράσχος, Έτος Α΄, ἀρ. 1. Βάρνα 19/5/1899 [The Impartial. Political, commercial, literary and social paper, published on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Director and Editor: A.D. Ekonomidis. Responsible: Dr. V.P. Paraschos. Year 1, no. 1, Varna 19/5/1899].

The paper clearly followed a pro-Turkish and anti-Russian line in politics, in the belief that it thus supported the true interests of the Greeks of Bulgaria<sup>41</sup>.

The responsible of the paper, Dr. V.P. Paraschos, was a well-known lawyer and a leading figure in the Greek community of Varna. In the edition of 27/5/1899 (no. 3) G. Vasiliadis is mentioned as responsible editor. As appears from a comment in the paper (no. 3 of 27/5/99), V Paraschos had left because adverse criticism and reaction against the Turcophile line of  $A\mu\epsilon\rho\delta$  were very strong, from the Bulgarian side<sup>42</sup>, but even more so from the Greek one<sup>43</sup>.

The last copy of the paper preserved is of 29/5/99 (no. 4). It is not known exactly when it went out of circulation.

A moral, social and encyclopaedic paper, published three times a month and prepared through the co-operation of many representatives of various branches of science, under D. Chadzidaniil, Doctor of Philosophy and Bachelor of Divinity. Year 1, no. 1, Varna, 10/1/1898].

From 1899 it was published twice a month.

Chadzidaniil published his translations of philosophical and religious works and his own treatises in separately published volumes<sup>45</sup>.

The periodical uses continuous numbering of pages throughout its issues. In its final issue no. 24 of 15/12/1900 it is announced that "The Banquet will become, from the sixth of January next, a political, social and literary weekly paper format...". Thus the following paper appears as its continuation.

It was published in a larger size than the  $\Pi a r \delta a \iota \sigma i a$  and the pages of the issues are not numbered continuously. Its last preserved issue is that of 9/7/1901 (no. 24). We do not know when it ceased publication.

The only sources on this paper are Ivančev and Bliznakov. According to their information, the paper was published in 1881 nos. 1-3, ?-15th June 1881 by N.S. Čolakov, whith parallel text in Greek and Bulgarian.

1896. Περίοδος Β', ἔτος A', ἀρ. 14748 [The Rostrum. Published in Pyrgos on Tuesdays and Fridays. Director and owner G.O. Skanavis. Series I, no. 147, Varna 20/11/1896. Series II, year 1, no. 1].

The paper, as we have already mentioned, appeared as a continuation of the Philippopolis  $OM\eta r \dot{v}\tau \omega \rho \tau o \tilde{v} A l \mu o v$ . This explains the numbering of its first issue, no. 147 (the  $M\eta r \dot{v}\tau \omega \rho$  having stopped at no. 146).

The co-owner of the newspaper was Nikolaos G. Nikolaidis

 $T\grave{o}$   $B\tilde{\eta}\mu a$  announces in its issue of 26/1/1897 no. 20 that it has obtained its own printing machine.

The paper often changed in format and size; from the issue of 7/4/1897 no. 36 onwards it was published in small format and became a daily paper up till no. 60 of 7/6/97 "because of the prevailing political circumstances, in which Greece is playing the leading part..."49. At this period the paper is full of correspondence from Greece, news from the front and foreign news. Copies of it were snapped up to use a modern phrase; a fact that shows the interest of the Greeks of Pyrgos in developments in Greece.

From no. 60 onwards the editors of the paper frequently changerd; Ghr. Papadopoulos, Ghr. Anastasiadis, Milt. Vazoles, and its format became larger, as before.

From the issue of 14/8/97 (no. 77) onwards, G.O. Skanavis became the only director and editor of  $To B\tilde{\eta}\mu a$ .

The last preserved issue is that of 4/1/1898 (no. 101). We do not know when it ceased publication.

16)  $\Theta EATH\Sigma$  [Spectator]<sup>50</sup>. Weekly newspaper. Publisher, director and editor-in-chief G. Gorgias. 31st March-22nd July 1899.

This paper has not been preserved in any library. Ivančev from whom the evidence on the paper comes, mentions that the heading and text were written in Greek, French and Bulgarian, and refers the reader to the Bulgarian press of the time<sup>51</sup>.

Information as to the existence of the paper and the name of its publisher are to be found in  $^{3}A\mu\epsilon\rho\delta\lambda\eta\pi\tau\sigma\varsigma$  no.  $2(22/5/99)^{52}$  and no.  $3(27/5/99)^{53}$ .

These periodical papers contain four pages of four, six or eight columns each and have the form and size of modern newspapers (apart from the  $\Pi av$ - $\delta a\iota \sigma i a$  and the  $\Upsilon \gamma \iota \iota i a$  published in the form of a periodical).

The paper's editorial, where there was one, was placed on the first page: it usually comments on internal or foreign events, and sometimes those of the community. Along with this appear foreign news, especially communications from the "Havas" agency, and dispatches from Greece. The interest shown by the Greeks of Bulgaria in the affairs of Greece proper can be seen from the fact that there was no Greek paper that did not dedicate at least one of its columns to news from Greece.

On page two we usually find internal Bulgarian news: reports from parliament (săbranie), government reports, news about the royal family, legislative decrees, various other pieces of news. Statements on the government's programme, the King's public address and the various legislative decrees were always in every newspaper, often in a supplement.

Local and community news is consigned to pages three and four; it contains reports by the local authorities and the Greek community on school examinations, the elections for the community elders, church festivals, theatrical performances, dances and all kinds of presentations of the Greek community, weddings, funerals, engagements etc. Also on page three is printed information on the Greek communities of other areas of Bulgaria, and frequently letters from readers on various community problems. The last two pages also contain, often in serials, excerpts from translations of literary works, and original philosophical, literary and archaeological treatises (see M. Apostolidis and Chr. Tsountas on the antiquities of Philippopolis in  $\Phi\iota\lambda\iota\pi\pi\sigma\acute{v}$ - $\pi\sigma\lambda\iota\varsigma$  and  $Ei\delta\acute{\eta}\sigma\epsilon\iota\varsigma$   $\tau\sigma\~{v}$   $Al\mu ov$ , Io. Nikolaou on the antiquities of Varna in  $O\delta\eta\sigma\sigma\acute{\sigma}\varsigma$ , and s.o.). The fourth page is usually dedicated to various advertisements for shops and products.

These newspapers offer unique information on the state of Greeks in Bulgaria in face of the internal problems of Bulgaria and Greece: on their cultural, and also political activity.
