# THE INSTITUTE FOR BALKAN STUDIES IN 1972 A REPORT ON ITS ACTIVITIES

In November 1972 the acting director of the Institute. Prof. Demetrios Delivanis, member of the Advisory Board and Dean of the Faculty of Law and Economic Sciences at the University of Thessaloniki, was succeeded in the direction of the Institute by Mr. Kariofilis Mitsakis, Professor of Modern Greek Literature at the Faculty of Philosophy and Letters of the same University. Professor K. Mitsakis was born in Thessaloniki in 1932. He studied at the University of Thessaloniki and afterwards became assistant to the chair of Byzantine Literature. He took his Ph. D. from the above Faculty with his thesis on the "Προβλήματα σγετικά μὲ τὸ κείμενο, τὶς πηγές καὶ τὴ γρονολόγηση τῆς 'Αγιλληΐδας" (Thessaloniki 1963, pp. 99). He also studied Byzantine and Modern Greek Literature at the University of Oxford and the Institut für Byzantinistik und Neugriechische Philologie at the University of Munich. Then he was appointed associate professor of Greek Literature at the University of Maryland, Washington, D.C. (1966-1968), and later he was elected "Sotheby and Bywater Professor of Byzantine and Modern Greek Language and Literature" at the University of Oxford (1968-1972). In 1972 he was appointed by the Faculty of Philosophy and Letters at the University of Thessaloniki professor of Modern Greek Literature. For the fifth year the Program for study Abroad, Center of International Education of the City University of New York, has functioned in Thessaloniki under the joint auspices of Queens College and the Institute for Balkan Studies.

The courses in Byzantine Civilization and Archaeology including field-work lasted six weeks from the 8th of July till the end of August. Students from the Colleges of the City University of New York attended these courses and they received credits for their respective schools after passing their term examinations in each of the above subjects.
